## **Trainee chefs share hospitality**

### ***GCSE students' creativity in the kitchen***

Hours of painstaking preparation saw Hospitality students prepare mouth-watering meals for a discerning clientele – our members of staff.

Over two days the students prepared 44 three-course meals, together with side dishes, and served their finished creations in a specially created pop-up restaurant.

As part of their final assessment the students had to plan, cook, plate and serve the meals, working against the clock.

The meals were made more special as they were the final ones to be served towards the GCSE qualification in Hospitality. Recent changes mean that the GCSE choice has changed to Food Preparation & Nutrition.

With the event carrying more than half the marks towards their final result, the students were assessed on their cooking skills, but also on teamwork, hygiene and safety and their planning.

Students came up with their ideas for the themes, which they 'pitched' within the team to decide what they would be. The first team devised a masquerade ball theme, with staff creating their own masks. An evening of Mexican cuisine followed, themed to the Mexican festival, 'Dia de los Muertos' (the Day of the Dead).

On each day, preparation and cooking began at 9am, continuing all day for a 4 o'clock call of 'Service!'

On the menu were choices including deep fried brie with cranberry sauce, chicken marinated in honey with ginger and mango salsa, and Oreo cheesecake. The Mexican menu offered spicy prawn salad, jalapeno peppers stuffed with cream cheese, spicy beef burritos and zesty fish cakes with mango salsa.

Teacher of Food and Nutrition Mrs Roby said, "Preparing and serving so many superb meals against the clock is challenging, and the students did so well. The experience that students gain equips them well to consider careers in the catering industry."



## Student entrepreneurs take to high profile selling

### *Young Enterprise*

Take nine Business Studies students, add a project that gives them practical experience of running a business. The students have met weekly through this term creating their company, MAD Creations, and already they are enjoying success.

Through the national Young Enterprise programme, the students gain real experience of the processes of design and manufacturing, marketing and selling. The students have created a variety of handmade gifts. So with Christmas approaching, where better to seek sales than the famous Manchester Christmas Markets.

The team divided into promotion and sales, competing with more than 40 schools from across Greater Manchester. The result was a hectic but in the end successful day. Our stall received the award for



the best trade stand, the result of well packaged products, and great design and set up of the stall.

The student business people are not stopping there. Before the end of term they opened their stall at school, and in February will visit the Trafford Centre for a further day's trading.

The project gives the students practical experience of running a business. They start out with a budget to get their business ideas up and running then work together to run a profitable, successful company.



### **Markets offer language practice too**

The popularity of the Christmas markets offered an interesting learning time too. With stall holders travelling from around Europe, The students took the time to practice their spoken language skills in French, Spanish and German with the traders.

The students were able to make themselves understood and gained congratulations from the continental visitors.

## Voices in unison

### *Students' Gospel performance*

Students' voices from four schools came together for a wonderful performance of Gospel music.

To prepare for the event, the singers worked with Tyndale and Kadria Thomas, from Voice Assembly, to learn the techniques of Gospel, as well as four songs for performance. A full day workshop put all the students through their paces together with students from Co-op Academy Failsworth.



For the concert itself, Oldham-based Soul Inspiration Gospel Choir and the Pennine Care NHS Trust Choir joined the students alongside singers from Crompton House and Newman College.

Amongst the musical entertainment on offer were Labi Siffre's *Something Inside So Strong*, Michael Jackson's *Can You Feel It?*, Tyndale Thomas's own composition *Top of the World*, and *Full of Wonder* by Naughty Boy.

Head of Music Mr Corrigan said, "It was a fantastic experience to work with such talented singers and with the other schools. The students learned so much from the workshop, making them better singers and having a really enjoyable time."

## Peer mentors share smiles

### *Anti bullying week*

Taking simple steps to encourage kindness was our focus as we celebrated the national Anti-Bullying Week in November.

The Peer Mentors team took the lead to ensure that students and staff discovered how they could help. Everyone was asked to think how they could be kind to each other at all times. At the Year 7 assembly the students spoke about how important it was not to tolerate bullying and to ensure that it is reported and dealt with.

Learning Mentor Miss Cavanagh said, "The simple act of sharing a smile can help people feel more positive around school, so that's just what the Peer mentors did. Whether it was a real smile or one of 150 'smile cards' that circulated around school this made a real difference."

Students recognised that it's important to acknowledge all the good things that are done for us. So Café Mojo saw the creation of a Thank You wall. Lots of balloons each contained a message of thanks to someone around the school. Continuing the kindness theme, there were lots of random acts of kindness carried out throughout school.

## Awareness tackles hate

### *Weekly staff training*

To build on the anti-bullying theme, the staff training meeting during the week set about raising awareness of bullying suffered by lesbian, bisexual, gay and transgender students.

The session was led by trainer and headteacher Rob Partington and emphasised how important it is to challenge the use of language that sets out to hurt.

The early finish for students each Wednesday afternoon enables a broad range of training for both teaching and support staff, carried out throughout the year.



## ***School falls silent for act of Remembrance***

### ***Lessons recall life in WW1 trenches***

Students at The Radclyffe School marked two minutes' silence on Friday (10<sup>th</sup> November) as part of a collective act of remembrance.

Each year students create a display, which provides a focus to help everyone to remember. Large paper poppies and images of remembrance form the display this year. One poignant exhibit is a series of posters all around the school where the surnames of current members of staff are matched with surnames on the thousands of graves managed by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.

The hymn *Abide With Me* called staff and students to the act of remembrance, which included the two minute's silence, the sounding of the Last Post and Sunset, and a reading of the poem *In Flanders Fields* written in 1915 by Canadian military doctor John McCrae.

Alongside the remembrance activity, Year 8 History students took a practical lesson in the experiences of the First World War. Former teacher Jason King shared his fascinating collection of historical artefacts with students, presenting the story of a typical soldier on the Western Front in 1914.

Head of Humanities Mrs Sykes said, "The remembrance event helps students to appreciate how important it is to learn about and remember what people went through in war. It is about more than studying History, giving everyone a time to remember the sacrifice and suffering people have gone through to protect freedom."



## Qualification giving students the (PiXL) edge

### *Tasks are building key skills*

Leadership, organization, resilience, initiative and communication - these five attributes will be growing stronger amongst year 7 and 8 students thanks to an exciting project, running throughout the year.

It is called PiXL Edge and is a qualification that students earn by taking part in accredited tasks and activities both in and out of school.

These can be either in lessons or in extra curricular activities. For each of the attributes students complete two activities. Our Year 7 and 8 students are working towards the Apprentice level.

Students have been creative in finding the tasks they want to carry out. Amongst those completed already have been leading warm up sessions in PE lessons, creating artwork which raised funds for the Manchester Arena victims, captaining a team in a Maths quiz, learning to play chess and creating a booklet about safety to help Year 6 pupils through transition.



Some of the tasks students are able to complete during their Citizenship & Values lessons, and others in their own time. The tasks are proving a great way to encourage students to be active and engaged in their local community.

Each student's achievements are recorded online, checked by teachers or by external leaders.

What can students expect to gain from earning the qualification? For students who successfully complete all their tasks, they will discover new skills and experiences. It will also prove useful when the time comes to apply for college, for university or for employment, students can show that they are more than just their academic grades.

## Music, Drama, Dance combine to entertain



## A taste of honey

### Lessons in beekeeping has sweet outcome

The bees of the Millbrow apiary have taught students important lessons about caring for these important insects. For the group who took part it also led to a presentation and a gift of the honey they helped to produce.

The apiary, which consists of three hives in the grounds of St Mathew's church, Chadderton has enjoyed a bumper crop this year, producing 131 pounds of honey, up from 18 the year before. During their student enrichment sessions earlier this year, the group visited the hives to see how they operate.



Aribah Khan, Year 9 said, "I enjoyed seeing how much honey the bees were making. We learned how they are looked after and how they increase."

Mahmood Jamil added, "It was interesting to take apart the hive and see how it's built. We also saw the queen."

Two of our members of staff, Mrs Barker and Mrs Grogan help out at the apiary.

Presenting certificates to the students Mrs Barker said "We were very impressed with how sensible all of the students were as they learned about looking after the bees."

## New skills and experiences

### Students thrive in ELAT activities

Caring for the bees was just one activity amongst many that students enjoy at the end of each half term. The final Wednesday ELAT sessions enable students to develop talents they know they have, or to try something new.

All Year 7 and 8 students take part, with the activities optional for Year 9. Amongst the choices this term have been origami, Christmas decoration making in Design & Technology, trampolining, badminton and baking mince pies. Some students also spent the session learning how to care for guinea pigs. All the activities link to the LORIC skills that students gain through their PixL Edge qualification (see page 8).

## Keeping students safe on local roads

### *Parking problems persist*

At this time of year, when many journeys to and from school are made in poor light and poor weather, students' safety on the roads around school is of great importance. Road Safety Week in November was an opportunity to remind drivers of the need to park with consideration for our neighbours, and to watch their speed on Hunt Lane.

Children need to be aware of how to safely cross busy roads and it is a message that we repeat at school. Broadway and Middleton Road have a heavy flow of often fast-moving traffic and we want all our students to travel to and from school safely. Wearing bright or reflective clothing can help drivers to see people crossing the road and so avoid accidents.

Students must also take care when crossing roads to ensure they can see traffic approaching. They should avoid crossing between parked cars, but this becomes difficult where Hunt Lane becomes busy at the beginning and end of the day. Wherever possible please consider allowing your children to walk a short distance to school to reduce congestion around the school gate.

## Claim for free school meals - it's your right

### *...and help the school to access extra funds*

Is your child eligible for free school meals? Please read on to see how claiming free meals benefits your child and gains an extra £935 funding for school.

The rising cost of living means everyone could use a little bit of help. If you are on low income and/or benefits then you may be able to claim free school meals for your child. The new Universal Credit system means more people are eligible for free school meals so it's worth checking to see if you qualify.

### ***This will not only help you, it will help the school too.***

Schools are given an extra £935 funding for every child who gets free school meals. We use this money to enrich your child's learning experience and offer learning opportunities they may not otherwise benefit from.

As a further bonus, evidence suggests that children who eat a healthy meal during the day achieve and perform better at school. Café Mojo offers a balanced and nutritious menu with the right ingredients to help your child succeed, and because we are cashless there is no difference between paid and free meal students.

We know that some parents may choose not to take up their entitlement to a free school meal. Please apply anyway as the school will still receive funding even if you don't wish to access a free daily meal.



### **How to apply**

Claiming your child's right to a free school meal is simple – call Oldham Council on 0161 770 6688 or download an application form from [www.oldham.gov.uk/info/200231/grants\\_and\\_allowances/161/school\\_meals](http://www.oldham.gov.uk/info/200231/grants_and_allowances/161/school_meals) and return to Customer Services, Civic Centre, PO Box 4, West Street, Oldham, OL1 1UH or return to the school and we'll forward your form to the Council for you.

However, please don't delay. Applications must be processed by mid-January in order for the school to receive the extra funding.
